

The Apostles: Witnesses of the Resurrection

The Gospels recount the events of the Apostles seeing Christ risen from the dead, even many times. They ate with Him, spoke with Him, touched Him and were amazed to see one who was once dead, now fully alive and glorified. The Apostles watched as Jesus ascended into Heaven. Immediately, before His departure, Jesus commanded them to go out to all nations proclaiming the mysteries of the Gospel. Each, individually, went out to the world and fulfilled Christ's command. Eventually, each one, except St. John, suffered martyrdom.

Their martyrdom underscored the reality and truth of Christ's Resurrection. Immediately after the Resurrection, people spread the rumor that the Apostles stole the body of Jesus and then proclaimed Him to be alive. This idea has continued throughout the ages. This idea of stealing the body of Jesus does not square up with the martyrdom of the Apostles. It is completely illogical to believe that one would suffer such horrible martyrdom in order to support a lie. This is especially true when considering that each was martyred separately. It is illogical to believe that one of the twelve would not have succumbed to disclosing that they had stolen the body of Jesus. Instead, each embraced death as a witness to the Resurrection. Finally, each apostles' tomb has been honored throughout history. The details of their martyrdom and tombs are different. Some are well documented, others less verifiable. But, all of their tombs are honored today. Listed here is a simple description of their martyrdom and location of their tomb. Their tombs continue to be visited and honored today. Their martyrdom and honored tombs support the reality of Christ's Resurrection.

12 Apostles, Death and location of Tomb

St. Peter. Crucified upside-down. St. Peter's Basilica, Rome.

St. Andrew. Crucified. Amalfi, Italy.
St. James the Greater. Beheaded. Santiago de Compostela, Spain St. James the Less. Stoned. Church of 12 Apostles, Rome.

St. Matthew. Speared. Salerno, Italy.

St. John. Natural causes. Ephesus, Turkey. St. Matthias. Crucified. Trier, Germany.

**Stations of the Resurrection:** We are all familiar with the Stations of the Cross prayed throughout Lent. We are less familiar with the Stations of the Resurrection. These focus on the different events of Christ's 40 days between His Resurrection. urrection and Ascension. Enclosed is a prayer sheet for praying the Stations of the Resurrection. I encourage you and your family to take time and pray these stations throughout the Easter Season. Copies are also available near the doors of the Church.

#### The Spiritual Life: Excerpt from *The Spiritual Life* by Adolphe Tanquerey, Desclee and Co., Belgium, 1951.

Beginners must also choose for the subject of meditation all the positive duties of the Christian: 1) General duties of religion towards God, of charity toward the neighbor, of mistrust of self on account of our helplessness and wretchedness. What will impress the beginners most will be the external acts of these virtues; but this will be a preparation for the more perfect practice of the same virtues in the illuminative way. 2) Particular duties, according to age, condition, sex, state of life. The fulfilment of these duties will prove to be the best kind of penance.

Since grace plays an all-important role in the Christian life, beginners must be gradually instructed in this doctrine. The spiritual director will explain to them in a familiar and easy way the doctrine of the indwelling of the Holy Spirit in our souls, of our incorporation into Christ, of sanctifying grace, of the virtues and of the seven gifts. At first, no doubt, they will grasp but the mere elements of these great truths, but even the little they will understand will not fail to exert a powerful influence of their spiritual formation and their spiritual progress. It is when we think of what God has done and incessantly does for us, that we are prompted to further generosity in His service. We should not forget that St. Paul and St. John preaches these truths to pagan neophytes who were but beginners in the spiritual life.

Then it will be easy and practical to propose Jesus as the model for true penitents. Jesus condemning Himself to a life of poverty, of obedience and of toil that He might be unto us an example Jesus doing penance for us in the desert, in the Garden of Gethsemane, in His cruel passion; Jesus dying for us upon the Cross. This series of meditations, presented to us by the Church in the yearly cycle of the liturgy, will have the advantage of making us practice penance in union with Jesus with greater generosity, with greater love and hence with greater efficacy.

#### THE LITURGICAL CORNER

The basic symbol for Christ in a Church is the altar. The significance of the altar is quite important from a spiritual point of view. This is for several reasons:

- The altar is a place for a sacrifice. One of the prayers of the Mass says of Christ that He made Himself "the Priest, the Altar, and the Lamb of Sacrifice." In other words, the altar, at one and the same time, is a symbol for Christ who is both doing the offering (through the ministry of the ordained priest) and at the same time is the one offered.
- The altar, because it is also a table, is a place for a meal. Here we feast on the Body and Blood of the Lord. Because this banquet is a sacred banquet, the altar is decorated with lit candles, because Christ is the light of the world.
- The altar is shown special reverence: it is kissed by the priest and deacon at the beginning and end of Mass; it is often incensed; a bow is made to the altar everytime someone passes in front of it.
- Though no longer required by Church law, altars traditionally had a special stone set in the center, appropriately called 'the altar stone.' This stone had five crosses etched into it, reminiscent of the five wounds of Christ, and also had relics, traditionally of the martyrs, set into the stone.

## Divine Mercy Sunday

Where did the feast of Divine Mercy come from?

If you were born well before the year 2000, you know the feast of Divine Mercy has not always been celebrated in the Church. In the early 1900s, a young Polish nun began receiving private revelations. Jesus appeared to her during her times of prayer, speaking a message of mercy and love for the world. She received a set of prayers — the Divine Mercy Chaplet — and the request to have a feast day established to remind the Church of the mercy of God. St. Faustina died in 1938, on the cusp of war and in the midst of one of the most violent centuries in the history of the world.

Her story and her diaries began circulating in Poland and beyond. It quickly became apparent that this was a holy young women, and the cause for her canonization opened. In the year 2000, she was canonized by the first-ever Polish pope, St. John Paul II. On her canonization day, he established the second Sunday of Easter as Divine Mercy Sunday, "a perennial invitation to the Christian world to face, with confidence in divine benevolence, the difficulties and trials that mankind with experience in the years to come." ©LPi
