PASTOR NOTE

Leap Year: Thurs. Feb. 29th is a special day as we celebrate Leap Year. I hope that you do something special to celebrate this unusual day. As you may know, each solar year has an extra 6 hours, which we kind of ignore. So, every four years our extra day makes up for lost time. I've been thinking about how we ought to make up for lost time. What is your "lost time" that you need to make up?

First Friday: Fri. March 1st is the First Friday of March. The first Friday is devoted to the Sacred Heart of Jesus. This day takes on special meaning as the only First Friday in Lent. I encourage you to make a special effort to attend the 7am Mass or the 5pm Confessions.

First Saturday Devotions: Sat. March 2nd, 7am is the First Saturday of March. The first Saturday is devoted to our Blessed Mother Mary. This day takes on special meaning as the only First Saturday in Lent. We will enjoy the usual first Saturday devotions which includes Mass, Eucharistic Adoration, Litany of Mary, Rosary and a brief moment of prayer. I encourage you to make a special effort to attend the First Saturday Devotions.

Magi Baby Chest Distribution: Sat. March 2nd, 9am to 12pm, the Magi Baby Chest will be open for distribution of baby supplies. Please, help spread the word this week. We want to help lots the children and families.

A Powerful Prayer: Each of us, in different ways, carry heavy burdens. These burdens may take the form of a sinful habit, a painful memory, an unshakable worry, a constant fear, or any hardship. Many times, we pray and pray without a healing or a lightening of this burden. I want to share with you a simple, yet powerful prayer. When you feel tempted by the sinful habit or feeling the old pain, worry or heavy burden: think of the Cross and say this simple prayer: "Jesus, kill this on your Cross." When the bad thing comes up again: think of the Cross and say this simple prayer: "Jesus, kill this!" "Kill this on your Cross." The provocative and direct words demonstrate an act of humble surrender to Jesus, especially in our moment of need. It cuts to the chase. It acknowledges His power over all sin and its effects. Through this prayer we unite our temptation or burden to the Cross of Jesus. The power of His Cross comes upon the difficulty. According to His providence, He will heal the temptation and burden. Or, He will strengthen us to travel the difficult road of carrying our Cross, which is the only path to

Heaven. In the meanwhile, He will give us patience and comfort along the road. However, it has been my experience that this simple and powerful prayer, more often than not, brings a real healing to the temptation or burden. When the temptation arises, or pain is felt, or burden is hard to carry, say: "Jesus, kill this on your Cross." I encourage you to try this new prayer in the face old problems. Make this prayer a habit in your life. I am confident that change will come to your life.

Besides the oft-renewed offering of their actions to God, they must be advised to recite during the course of the day some quick prayers to do some devout reading suited to their state of soul on such fundamental truths as the end of man, sin, mortification, confession, and the examination of conscience, adding thereto the lives of Saints who were noted for the practice of the virtue of penance. Such reading will be a light to the mind, a stimulus to the will, and a great help to mental prayer. The recitation of some decades of the beads, with meditation upon the mysteries of the Rosary, will be productive of an increased devotion to the Blessed Virgin and will strengthen the habit of union with our Lord. A visit to the Blessed Sacrament, varying in duration according to their occupations, will reanimate within them the spirit of piety.

In the evening, a serious examination of conscience, followed by the particular examination, will help beginners to note their failings, to foresee the remedies and to muster the strength of the will needed to renew their purpose of amendment, thus preventing them from falling into indifference or lukewarmness. Here one must recall what we have said anent the examinations of conscience, and regarding confession, and remember that examination of beginners must bear chiefly upon deliberate venial sins. Such watchfulness is the best means of avoiding mortal sin and of repairing any grave sin committed in an unguarded moment.

Beginners should see to it that they do not burden themselves with too many spiritual exercises that might hinder the fulfilment of their duties of state or be detrimental to true devotion. Less prayers and more attention is preferable. There are beginners who readily imagine that they grow in piety as they multiply their vocal prayers.

THE LITURGICAL CORNER

The number "40" is a significant number in the Bible. We think of the 40 days and nights during the great Flood in the time of Noah. We think of the 40 years the Israelites wandered through the desert in search of the Promised Land. And in the Lenten season we think of the 40 days Jesus was in the desert fasting and praying and doing spiritual combat with Satan. This is why the Lenten season is a season of 40 days. But if you are very good with numbers, you might notice that from Ash Wednesday to The Easter Vigil, the number of days is actually 46. How is it that we say that Lent is 40 days long?

Presently, the season of Lent ends on the evening of Holy Thursday, when the Sacred Triduum (Holy Thursday - Good Friday - Easter Vigil) occurs. But in the very early days of the Church, before Holy Thursday and Good Friday developed as liturgical celebrations, Lent ended on Holy Saturday night. Now fasting was a very important part of the Lenten season, but Sundays were never considered a day to fast, because every Sunday, even during Lent, is a day to celebrate the resurrection of Jesus, and there can be no fasting on such a day. So, the 6 Sundays of the Lenten season did not count. Therefore, when one takes the 46 days between Ash Wednesday and Easter Vigil, and subtracts the 6 Sundays of the Lenten season, we arrive at the number 40.
