PASTOR NOTE



Happy New Year!!! Or, for us Catholics, Happy Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God. This feast is always celebrated on January 1st. I think it is wonderful how the Church invokes Mary at the start of the New Year, especially under her title as Mother of God. We need to invoke our Blessed Mother as we start the holy work of a new year. Just like a mother nurtures her child near birth, may Mary nurture us at the birth of a new year. Usually, this solemnity is a Holy Day of Obligation. However, this year it is not, because it falls on a Monday. Mass will be at 9am on New Year's Day.

Solemnity of Epiphany: Next Sunday, January 7th, the Church celebrates the Feast of Epiphany. This remembers the event of the three kings visiting baby Jesus and offering adoration and praise. This event has special meaning in our parish since we started the Magi Baby Chest.

For many centuries there has been a wonderful tradition associated with the Feast of the Epiphany. This tradition is a house blessing. The Magi visited the home of Jesus, Mary and Joseph. We are called to be like the Magi who acknowledged that Holy Family was in the house. In our homes we are to be like the Magi acknowledging that Jesus, Mary, and Joseph are in our homes making them holy. Also, we want to become holy like the Holy Family. Also, the Magi provided hospitality to the Holy Family. We ask the Magi to help us offer hospitality and kindness to the members of our family.

I encourage you and your family to join in this age-old tradition of blessing your home on or near the celebration of Epiphany. The ritual is not very long, and children will really love it. Near the doors of the church you will find a bag that contains what is needed for the house blessing: chalk and the prayer sheet. The ritual will explain how to do the house blessing. The chalk is used to traditionally mark the top of the door of your house. It is marked 20+C+M+B+24. The numbers are the year, 2024. The letters are the initials of the three Magi: Casper, Malchior and Balthasar. The letters also match the initials of the house blessing in Latin: "Christus Mansionem Benedicat." This translates as "May Christ bless this house." When a house is blessed, God showers blessings upon the family and guests. I encourage you take a minute and offer this house blessing.

The Prayers of Beginners:

We have already explained the nature and the efficacy of prayer. After beginners have been reminded of these notions, they must: be instructed as to the necessity and the conditions of prayer; they must be gradually introduced to the practice of such spiritual exercises as befit them; they must be taught mental prayer.

Article I: Necessity and Conditions of Prayer.

Necessity of Prayer: What we have said regarding the twofold end of prayer, worship and petition, shows us clearly its necessity. It is evident that as creatures and as Christians we are bound to glorify God through adoration, thanksgiving and love; that as sinners we must offer Him reparation. Here it is question of prayer chiefly as petition, and of its absolute necessity as a means of salvation and perfection.

The necessity of prayer is based on the necessity of actual grace. It is a truth of faith that without such grace we are utterly incapable of obtaining salvation and, still more of attaining perfection. Of ourselves, no matter how we use our freedom, we can do nothing positive that would preserve for any length of time, much less until death: "Without me you can do nothing...Not that we are sufficient to think anything of ourselves, as of ourselves...For it is God who worketh in you, bot to will and to accomplish."

THE LITURGICAL CORNER


Because the Mass is the "source and summit" of the Church's life and activity, the more we understand it, the more we understand our own life and activity as members of the Church. There are so many questions concerning the various parts of the Mass, the sacred vestments and sacred vessels used during Mass, the various objects in the sanctuary, etc. For the next several months, this column will address many of those questions, which hopefully will give us all a better appreciation of the Mass, which is the most perfect prayer which can be offered to God.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church, paragraphs 1328 - 1332, (abbreviated CCC) reminds us that the sacrament of the Eucharist is such an inexhaustible mystery that it goes by many names. Three of these names which are most familiar to us tell us something special about the Mass.

Holy Eucharist. The word Eucharist comes from the Greek, meaning "to give thanks." This reminds us of the Jewish practice of blessing God for three of His special works: creation, redemption and sanctification. Every time we go to Mass, each of these three realities are celebrated: our new creation in Christ, who redeemed us by His death and resurrection, and has made us a holy (sanctified) people.

The Holy Sacrifice of the Mass. We are reminded in this title that the Mass is truly a sacrifice. Jesus does not suffer and

die all over again; that would be impossible. He did that once for all. So in what sense can we say that the Mass is a "holy sacrifice?" Because the Mass makes present to us now, through the appearance of bread and wine, the one sacrifice of Christ. It is truly the Body and Blood of Him who suffered, died and rose which we receive in every Mass. Holy Mass. The word "Mass" comes from the Latin word "missa," which means "to be sent." Every Mass has a dismissible of the Mass and the M sal, because we are sent forth into the world to live what we have just celebrated. We who have received Christ are to bring him into every aspect of our lives.
