#### **PASTOR NOTE**

Holy Week: Today we enter into the most holy week of the year. We recall the saving work of our Lord Jesus. I invite you to enter more deeply into the mysteries of this week. Please join us for the special Masses this week. It is my prayer that the events of this week will draw us more deeply into the death and Resurrection of Jesus.

Holy Thursday Mass, 7pm. Good Friday Stations, 12 noon, Service, 3pm. Holy Saturday, Easter Vigil Mass, 8pm. Regretfully, there are no candidates entering the Church at the Easter Vigil. We will still enjoy a party following the Easter Vigil. Easter Sunday, 7:30am, 9:00am, 10:30am.

During Holy Week, the church will be unlocked throughout the day. The East door near the Mother's Chapel will be unlocked from about 7 or 8am to about 8pm. You and your family are invited to stop by the church and enjoy a quiet prayerful moment. Booklets for the Stations of the Cross will be available near the first station. There is great beauty and grace while quietly praying the Stations alone or with your family. It is also wonderful to enjoy the peaceful quiet of the church while praying before the Blessed Sacrament bathed in the beautiful windows' light. I encourage you to stop by the Church for prayer during this Holy Week.

Extra Confessions: One of the best ways to receive our Lord's saving grace during Holy Week is by making a good confession. I encourage you to make a good confession during one of these extra Confession times: Mon. 3/25 at 5pm; Tue. 3/26 at 7:30am; Wed. 3/27 at 5pm; Thur. 3/28at 4pm; Fri. 3/29 after 12pm Stations; Sat. 3/30 at 3pm.

Holy Thursday Church Visits: There is a long-standing tradition of visiting neighboring churches on Holy Thursday night. This imitates Jesus praying in the garden with His disciples. Many graces are received when visiting three churches on Holy Thursday night. Most church remain open quite late on Thursday night.

Divine Mercy Parish Celebration: Sunday, April 7, 2:30pm Adoration, 3pm Divine Mercy Chaplet followed by Benediction, 3:30 dinner from Los Ranchitos, followed by family and kids' activities, adult social time, and wonderful door prizes.

Mental Prayer of Beginners: Necessity

Systematic meditation is a highly effective means of sanctification; however, it is not necessary for the salvation of most Christians. What is necessary is prayer by which we render homage to God and obtain grace. Evidently, this cannot be done without attention on the part of the mind and desire on the part of the heart. No doubt, to prayer must be joined the consideration of the great Christian truths and of the great Christian duties, together with self- examination. But we accomplish all these without the practice of systematic meditation, by simply listening to the religious instructions given in Church, by pious reading, and by the examination of conscience.

Meditation, however, is most useful and most profitable to all for salvation and perfection; to beginners, as well as to more advanced souls. It may be even said that it is the most effective means of assuring one's salvation. This is the teaching of St. Alphonsus, who gives the follow reason, that whilst habitually practicing the other exercises of piety, like the Rosary, the Little Office of the Blessed Virgin, fasting, etc...one may unfortunately, still continue to live in mortal sin, whilst the habitual practice of mental prayer cannot suffer one to remain long in such a state. One either relinquishes mental prayer or relinquishes sin. How could we day by day go into the presence of God, the source of all holiness, while conscious of mortal sin, and not determine, with the help of grace, to break with sin and to seek in the Tribunal of Penance that pardon the supreme need of which we recognize? But, if we have not appointed time and not practical method for the consideration of the great religious truths, we allow ourselves to be carried away by dissipation of mind and the example of the world, until we lapse into sin and live in sin.

If devoted men and women who dedicate part of their time to works of zeal. If they want their apostolate to be fruitful, it must be vivified by the spirit of recollection and by prayer. Let it not be urge that the time consecrated to this exercise is taken from works of zeal. It would be to approach to great error to imagine that action is more necessary than grace and prayer, whereas in reality works of zeal are all the more faithful, as they are inspired by a life of greater interior recollection, which is in turn nourished by mental prayer.

#### THE LITURGICAL CORNER

Today begins what is appropriately called "Holy Week." In some countries and languages, this week is known as "Great Week," and it is not difficult for us to see why. One of the prayers of the liturgy this week reminds us that we are celebrating "the great events which gave us new life in Christ." There is so much one could say about Holy Week, and especially about the heart of it, namely the Sacred Triduum, that is, Holy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter Vigil. Triduum means "three days." From a liturgical point of view, we notice that on each of the days of the Triduum there is a procession, which is very significant to worship:

- On Holy Thursday, the procession is with the Eucharist to the Place of Reservation, commonly called the Repository. What is being celebrated during this procession is the exaltation of Christ. He is with us "on the way," which is why we have a procession.
- On Good Friday, the procession is with the Cross. Again, the "way" of Christ was one of suffering love.
- On Easter Vigil, the procession is with the Easter Candle, and in fact the candle is at the head of the procession. Christ our Light leads the way, and where He leads us is into His sanctuary, the closest place to heaven on earth.


