Division of the First Book

Once we know the end, we must determine the means necessary for its attainment. Fundamentally, they may be reduced to two: prayer, through which grace is obtained, and mortification through which we correspond to grace. Mortification assumes different names according to the point of view from which we consider it. It is called penance when it prompts us to atone for our past faults; mortification properly so called, when it sets upon the love of pleasure in order to reduce the number of faults in the present and obviate their recurrence in the future; it is called warfare against the capital sins, when it combats those deep-rooted tendencies that incline us towards sin, and warfare against temptation, when practiced by way of resistance to the onslaughts of our spiritual enemies. Hence the five following chapters:

Chapter 1: Prayer of beginners

Chapter 2: Penance, to atone for the past

Chapter 3: Mortification, to safeguard the future

Chapter 4: Warfare against capital sins

Chapter 5: Warfare against temptation

All of these means clearly presuppose the practice in some degree of the theological and the moral virtues. No one can pray, no one can do penance, and mortify himself, without a firm belief in revealed truth, without the expectation of a heavenly reward, without love of God, without the exercise of prudence, justice, fortitude and temperance. We shall speak of these virtues when we treat of the illuminative way wherein they attain their full development.


THE LITURGICAL CORNER

This feature is called "The Liturgical Corner." We often hear the word "liturgy" used. It is a Greek word, meaning "work of the people." In the time of ancient Greece, the word 'liturgy' indicated some public service done for the good of people, often performed by the influential and the wealthy. We know how much the Greeks loved theater. Someone would have to pay to equip the cast with costumes and the chorus with its musical instruments. This public service done by influential people was called a "liturgy," that is, a work of the people.

When the first Christians followed the Lord's command at the Last Supper - Do this in memory of Me - they realized that a work was being performed for them by THE influential Person, Jesus Christ. His wealth was the immense wealth of divine love. So when the Christians went to the Eucharist, they borrowed the word "liturgy" from its common use, and saw that it was appropriate to use that word to describe what they were about when they gathered for worship. Those two ideas, that it was public and a service, was borrowed to explain how the celebration of the Sacred Liturgy (the Mass) was public prayer, service rendered to God the Father through Jesus Christ.

The first document written at the Second Vatican Council was The Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy. In paragraph seven of that Constitution, we read these words: "The liturgy is rightly seen then as an exercise of the priestly office of Jesus Christ...In it full public worship is performed by the Mystical Body of Jesus Christ, that is, by the Head and His members." Jesus Christ is the High Priest at every Mass, worshipping the Father in and through His Body, the Church. We should never think that it is only "we" who are offering worship to God, but remember that it is "we" in union with "Christ." As the prayer of the Mass says: "Through Him, with Him, in Him, O God Almighty Father, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all glory and honor is Yours, forever and ever."
