PASTOR NOTE

Moral Analysis of In Vitro Fertilization: A recent Alabama Supreme Court decision regarding in vitro fertilization has sparked a national discussion. I have drawn up an article that explains the Church's teaching on IVF. This article was sent through Flocknote earlier this week. You may contact the Parish Office to obtain an electronic copy. Paper copies are available at the doors of the church. I encourage you to read this article and learn why IVF is gravely immoral. I hope that this article will help inform you as this issue is part of our national discussion. Please contact me if you have any questions or need further clarity.

Haiti Collection: For many years, our parish has collected funds for assistance to a parish in Haiti. Your donations have greatly assisted this needy parish. Our last transfer of funds was in late 2022. As I discussed a few months ago, the political situation in Haiti prohibits a safe and secure method for transferring the funds to the parish in Haiti. Our office has attempted to remedy this situation without success. Therefore, it is with a heavy heart that I have decided to end our parish's assistance to the parish in Haiti.

I kindly ask that you no longer use the blue Haiti envelop in the collection. Future envelope packets will not include an envelope for Haiti. I encourage you to direct your previously earmarked donations for Haiti to other ministries such as our parish, the Magi Baby Chest, the Diocese of Peoria Missionary program, or other Catholic organizations.

Since the last distribution in 2022, significant funds have accumulated which are earmarked for Haiti. You may request that the parish reimburse you for your Haiti donations offered after January 1, 2023. Please contact our office for this reimbursement. I kindly ask that you request this return by March 31, 2024. After March 31st, I will redistribute the remaining funds to other charitable organizations. I am considering organizations that generally match the intention of assisting a needy parish. I welcome any suggestions.

Catholic Forum: Part of our Lenten journey is to go deeper into our understanding of the faith. This understanding often comes through questions being answered. Each month you have opportunity to attend the Catholic Forum, first Sundays, 6:30pm at Harkrader Hall. During this time, questions are posed by the attendees and I do my best to answer them. Mental Prayer of Beginners: General Notions

We have said that there are two kinds of prayer: vocal prayer, expressed by word or by gesture, and mental prayer which takes place wholly within the soul. Mental prayer is defined as a silent elevation and application of our entire mind and heart to God in order to offer Him our homages and to promote His glory by our advancement in virtue.

It comprises of five elements: 1) the religious duties rendered to God or to the Lord Jesus Christ or to the Saints; 2) considerations bearing upon God an our personal relations with Him, in order to deepen and strengthen our convictions; 3) examination of conscience, in order to determine how we stand in relation to the subject of meditation; 4) prayer of petition by which we ask of God the graces necessary for exercising ourselves more perfectly in this or that particular virtue; 5) resolutions to do better in the future. These various acts need not follow in the order just described, nor must they all, of necessity, have a place in every meditation. Moreover, mental prayer must be prolonged over a notable period of time to deserve the name of meditation and to be distinguished from mere quick prayers.

As souls advance in perfection and acquire convictions which are easily renewed, they gradually devote less time to considerations and examinations, and give more to affections and petitions. These in turn become more and more simple, and at times mental prayer consists in a simple and loving gaze upon God. – This we shall explain later.

The terms meditation and mental prayer are often interchanged. When differentiated, the former is applied to that form of mental prayer wherein considerations and reasonings predominate and which, owing to this, is called discursive meditation. The latter name is chiefly applied to those forms of mental prayer wherein pious affections or acts of the will are predominant. Discursive meditation itself, however, already contains affections, and affective prayer is ordinarily preceded or accompanied by some considerations, excepting the case when the soul is seized by the light of contemplation.

The kind of prayer generally suited to beginners is discursive meditation. They need it in order to acquire convictions or to strengthen them. There are, however, some souls who from the outset give considerable place to affections. But, all must be taught that the best part of mental prayer lies in the acts of the will.

THE LITURGICAL CORNER

The Stations of the Cross are a devotion associated with the Lenten season. In the fourteenth century the Franciscans were given custody of the Holy Land and they became the caretakers of the churches and various sites where Jesus walked and preached. These Franciscans developed in Jerusalem the custom of walking along the road on which Jesus walked to Calvary, stopping at various points, or stations, to reflect. Originally there was no fixed number of stations, but in 1731 Pope Clement XII fixed the number at 14. One must remember that at this time most people did not read, and in fact the printing press was only developed in the 15th century. Art work, paintings and sculpture served as a way of teaching the faith. That is why every Catholic Church has the Stations of the Cross erected in them. Because it was the Franciscans who developed this devotion, they have the privilege of blessing and erecting the Stations in all Catholic Churches.


The Easter Memorial Flower Forms are located on the Church information tables. Donations will be used to help decorate the Church for Easter. **Deadline is March 24th.**
