


PASTOR NOTE



Happy Easter! Jesus Christ is truly risen! This is the most important feast of the entire Church year. We remember and celebrate Christ's resurrection. I pray that each of us will be renewed in our faith in the power and love of Christ. Through the Resurrection, He has opened the gates of Heaven and empowered us to live with Him forever. He has proven that He truly is the Son of God and has given us a share in His divinity, power and love. May each of us be renewed and filled with joy as we celebrate our new life in Christ. Christ has risen! Let us rejoice and be glad!

At that time, people counted any part of a day as a full day. So, Jesus was buried on Friday (day one), silently entombed on the Sabbath, Saturday, (day two), and then early in the morning on Sunday, the first day of the Jewish week, Sunday, (day three). On the third day, Easter Sunday, there was a great earthquake; for an angel of the Lord descended from heaven, approached, rolled back the stone, and sat upon it. His appearance was like lightening and his clothing was white as snow. The soldiers, who were guarding Jesus' tomb, became shaken with fear of the angel. The guards ran away. A bit later, the women came to the tomb. The angel said to them, "Do not be afraid! I know that you are seeking Jesus the crucified. He is not here, for he has been raised just as He said. Come and see the place where He lay. Then, go quickly and tell His disciples" (Matt 28:2-10).

Three days after Jesus was crucified and buried, He truly rose from the dead. Each Gospel includes accounts of Jesus' resurrection. Each tell us that the tomb was empty. Each show us that Jesus was truly alive and demonstrated the signs of life: walking, eating, and talking. The disciples touched Him. He touched them. For forty days after the resurrection, Jesus clearly showed that He was alive – not a ghost and not a fantasy. He was really, truly, absolutely alive! The same Jesus that they knew in His public ministry, the same Jesus they saw crucified, the same Jesus who they buried in the tomb, was the same Jesus standing before them – resurrected from the dead. Jesus did not resurrect into a new body. It was the same body that He always had. But, His body was now glorified. He retained His wounds of crucifixion without pain or bleeding. He could walk through locked doors. He could vanish from their sight. Later, He would ascend into heaven in His glorified body. His resurrection is a promise for our future glorification and entrance into heaven. May these days of Easter renew our faith and devotion to Jesus. Let us rejoice and be glad!

Characteristics of Meditation of Beginners:

We have already said that the mental prayer of beginners is chiefly a discursive prayer, wherein, though the affections have their place, reasoning predominates. We now explain the ordinary subjects of their meditation, and the obstacles they meet.

The beginners must, in general, meditate upon whatever is calculated to inspire them with a growing horror for sin, upon the causes of their own faults, upon mortification that removes such causes, upon the principal duties of their state, upon fidelity to grace and its abuse, upon Jesus Christ, a model for penitent sinners.

In order to acquire a growing horror for sin, they must meditate on the end of man and of the Christian, and hence upon the creation of man, his elevation to the supernatural state, his fall and his redemption; upon the rights of God as Creator, Sanctifier and Redeemer; upon such of the divine attributes as would inspire them with a horror for sin, for instance, God's immensity, whereby He is present to all creatures and especially to the soul in the state of grace; upon His holiness whereby He is bound to hate sin; upon His justice which punishes it; upon His mercy that moves Him to forgive it. All these truths tend to make us flee from sin, the one obstacle to the attainment of our end, the one enemy of God, the destroyer of that supernatural life give to us by God as the great proof of His love for us, and restore to us by the Redeemer at the price of His blood.

Upon sin: its origin, punishment, malice and frightful consequences; upon the causes leading to sin: the world, the flesh and the devil.

Upon the means of expiating and preventing sin: penance, and the mortification of our different faculties, of our evil tendencies, and chiefly of the seven capital vices. From our meditations on these points, we shall draw the conclusion that there is no safety as long as we have not uprooted or at least controlled all of these disordered inclinations.

THE LITURGICAL CORNER

"This is our Passover Feast..." These words are sung at the Easter Vigil, during the singing of the Exultet, a great song acclaiming Christ our Risen Lord. When we hear the word "passover," we think of our Jewish ancestors, as the angel of death passed over their houses during the last of the 10 plagues. We also think of how they passed through the Red Sea, out of the slavery of Egypt to march forward to the Promised Land.

Jesus Christ both passed through and passed over, in a very unique way. He 'passed through' life, suffering and death, all the while 'passing over' the temptation to be separated from God His Father. Each person must pass through life as well, and experience all that life brings us, both its joys and sorrows. It is such a consolation for us to know that Jesus has done this for us, in our own flesh. What we are trying to do, only possible in union with Jesus, it to live our lives the way He did, to resist the temptation to be separated from God. Of course, unlike Jesus, we are sinners. FOOD PANTRY UPDATE: Last weekend the Knights of Columbus collected 265 nonperishable food items and \$1,505 in monetary donations for the Bureau County Food Pantry. There were many high need items donated (peanut butter, cereal and canned chicken) and the Pantry was very appreciative. The number of families, along with Seniors, needing help continues to grow every month. St. Louis parishioners have now contributed 28,627 nonperishable food items and \$164,139 in monetary donations since we started collecting for the Food Pantry in August of 2012. 




