

PASTOR NOTE



We have several updates regarding our Growing Disciples initiative:

- The Growing Disciples Core Team has met with the Pastoral Commission (comprised of parishioners from each vicariate) and the Presbyteral Council (comprised of priests from each vicariate) to review the Round Three models it created based on the feedback from the Round Two models. All the feedback from both meetings has been submitted to the Bishop to consider as part of his discernment.
- The Round Three models recommended to the Bishop by the Core Team will be made public. The Bishop wanted you to see the information he is discerning for several reasons:
 - He is committed to transparency in the Growing Disciples process.
 - There are changes from the Round Two models based on the feedback the Core Team received.
 - It will help all of us begin to work within our parish community and nearby parishes to prepare hearts and minds for change. Regardless of what may happen to our parish, everyone will experience a change, whether it is a new structure for our parish or the parish we grew up in, a new priest, or a renewed commitment and focus to evangelization and growing disciples.

The Round Three models will be posted on growingdisciplescdop.org on Sunday, March 10 at 6 pm.

The time for the Bishop's discernment has begun. He will take everything he has heard and seen, revisit notes and letters, and bring it all to prayer. Please pray that the Holy Spirit continues to guide him and the Growing Disciples process.

Mental Prayer of Beginners: Advantages

Meditation, as we have described it, is most helpful for the attainment of salvation and perfection.

It detaches us from sin and its causes. – When we sin, it is through thoughtlessness and lack of will power. This twofold defect, however, is corrected by meditation.

It enlightens us as to malice of sin and its fearful consequences, by showing it to us in the light of God, or eternity, and of what Jesus Christ did in order to atone for it. It is meditation that leads us in spirit into the hallowed solitudes wherein we find God alone – in peace, in calm, in silence, in recollection. The same it is that in spirit makes us descend to hell, therein to see our place; that brings us before the grave to see our last abode; that takes us up to Heaven to see our throne of glory; that carries us to the Valley of Josaphat to see our Judge; to Bethlehem to see our Savior; to Mount Tabor to see our Love and to Calvary to see our Model. Meditation, likewise, detaches us from the world and its false pleasures. In reminds us of the instability of worldly goods, the anxiety they bring, the void, the ennui in which they plunge the soul. It forearms us against a false and corrupt world and makes us realize that God alone can constitute our bliss. Above all it detaches us from our pride and from our sensuality, by placing us before God who is the fulness of being, and before our nothingness; by making us understand that sensual pleasure reduces to the level of the brute, whilst godly ennoble us and make us sour unto God.

Meditation strengthens our will, not merely by providing us with strong convictions, as we have just said, but also by gradually healing our languor, our cowardice, and our fickleness. God's grace alone, our own efforts helping, can cure such infirmities. Now, meditation makes us ask for this grace all the more insistently, as it brings home to us through reflection our helplessness; whilst the acts of sorrow, of contrition that we perform, the firm purpose of amendment we conceive during meditation, together with the resolutions we take, already constitute an active co-operation with grace.

THE LITURGICAL CORNER

Imagine if you received a letter from a very important, world renowned person. You would probably show that letter to all of your friends, and certainly you would not treat it like any other piece of mail. You might even have it framed or laminated as a way of showing it special respect. At every Mass we hear proclaimed to us the word of God. God Himself speaks to us through His inspired word. That is why there are all kinds of marks of respect for the word of God: we carry it in procession and place it on a pulpit. All Scripture is inspired, but the four gospels have always had a special place in the formation of the Christian people, because they recount the words and deeds of Jesus. So to give special honor to the Gospel, we stand, and sometimes the gospel is incensed and surrounded by two candles as marks of respect.

Perhaps you notice a special gesture made by the priest before he proclaims the gospel, or a special blessing given to the deacon before he proclaims the Gospel. The priest bows his head and silently prays: "Almighty God, cleanse my heart and my lips that I may worthily proclaim your gospel." In the case of the deacon, the priest blesses the deacon and prays the same prayer for him. This reminds us of something that happened to the prophet Isaiah in the Old Testament, when an angel touched his tongue with a hot coal so as to purify him for his service as one who would speak God's word. Since all of God's ordained ministers are unworthy, they pray this prayer before proclaiming the gospel, a sure reminder not only of their unworthiness, but also of the holiness of the word which they are about to proclaim.
