# The Spiritual Life: Excerpt from The Spiritual Life by Adolphe Tanquerey, Desclee and Co., Belgium, 1951.

Now, barring the first grace, which is gratuitously given us since it is itself the principle of prayer, it remains ever true prayer is the normal, the efficacious, and the universal means through which God wills that we obtain all actual graces. This is the reason why our Lord insists so frequently upon the necessity of prayer: "Ask, and it shall be given you; seek, and you shall find; knock and it shall be opened to you. For every one that asks, receives: and he that seeks, finds: and to him that knocks, it shall be opened." Almost all commentators add that it is as if He said: "Unless you ask, you shall not receive; unless you seek, you shall not find." On this necessity of prayer our Lord constantly insists, especially when it is a question of resisting temptation: "Watch ye and pray that you enter not into temptation: the spirit is willing, but the flesh is weal." St. Thomas asserts that confidence not based on prayer is presumption, for God, who is not in justice bound to grant us His grace, (Continued on next page)

has not pledged Himself to give it except through prayer. God, assuredly, does know our spiritual needs without our exposing them to Him, yet He wills that prayer be the spring that sets in motion His loving mercy, so that we may acknowledge Him as the Author of this gifts He bestows on us.

This is likewise the way in which tradition has understood the teaching of our Lord. The Council of Trent, making its own the teaching of St. Augustine, tells us that God does not command the impossible, for He commands us to do what we can and to ask His help for what we cannot do, His grace helping us to ask for it. This manifestly implies that there are things which without prayer are impossible. Such is the conclusion the Roman Catechism draws: "Prayer is the indispensable instrument give us by God in order to obtain what we desire: there are things, in fact, impossible to obtain without aid of prayer.

#### THE LITURGICAL CORNER


Clothing is important. What we wear and how we dress tells us and others what we think of them. The same is true of Mass. We should dress appropriately for Mass, for what we wear tells us and others how important we believe the Mass is, and how important God is in our lives. Because the priest is the sacred minister of the sacred mysteries, he is given special clothing to wear during the celebration of the Mass.

St. John Vianney, the patron saint of parish priests, once said that the priest should be very simple in his own personal lifestyle, but when it comes to the Mass, nothing should be spared, since nothing is more important than giving God perfect worship and adoration. That is why sacred vestments and vessels are to made of quality material, because the use for which they are intended is of the highest significance and for the most important spiritual actions. Sometimes people think that it is a waste of money to purchase beautiful things for the Church, when there are so many other needs to attend to. But of course, one can and should do both. In fact, when the Liturgy is beautifully celebrated, with appropriate dignity and reverence, it is a sign that we take God very seriously in our lives. And the more we take God seriously, the more we are motivated to be just as serious in putting into practice in our daily lives all the corporal and spiritual works of mercy. If we celebrate Mass casually, as if it were the same as any other gathering, we will remain lukewarm in the living out of our faith. But if we put everything we can into the Mass - and that includes beautiful music, beautiful vestments and vessels - then we are likely to be inspired to take that beauty into the world by a Christian life which is beautifully lived, by loving one another and serving one another out of reverence for Christ.


Happy Epiphany to you from the Magi Baby Chest!!

# EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP - RECOGNIZE GOD IN YOUR ORDINARY MOMENTS

Wise Men See God in the Simple Things

If you're on social media, you have probably seen a meme going around that features this quote: "God has a plan for your life. The enemy has a plan for your life. Be ready for both. Just be wise enough to know which one to battle and which one to embrace."

There were certainly two competing plans for the Magi: God's and Herod's. And, wise as they supposedly were, it wasn't entirely easy for the Magi to discern which was which.

After all, Herod posed as a friend. He offered the Magi hospitality and kindness. Though the Gospel doesn't say so, he probably flattered them and appealed to every moral weakness he could observe in them. In his palace, they must have felt great physical comfort — rest and tables of plenty on what was an otherwise long and treacherous journey.

But if the Magi were honest with themselves, I'll bet they would have admitted that, regardless of Herod's charm, they felt a gnawing sense of doubt while in his presence. When they looked upon the Christ Child, born in a stable without any of the comforts of the world or protections of wealth, they probably felt the opposite. They probably felt safe.

The Magi were lucky enough to have the right plan spelled out for them in a dream, but for the rest of us, it's enough to remember this: God's plan is often the one that leads us to places of great simplicity, great humility and great love. Let's have the wisdom to view power with suspicion, and innocence with admiration.
