A MESSAGE FROM FATHER HEPNER

Dear parishioners,

Let me tell you about the time I almost died. When I was 15 years old, I travelled to Estes Park Colorado with my parish's youth group for the second summer in a row. The previous year we hiked up a few mountains, but there was one *big* one that we all wanted to summit but didn't get the chance: Mount Meeker. Located to the west, right behind St. Malo's Retreat Center, it stood majestically in the early sun the first morning that I woke up and looked out of my window to see the Rockies. From that morning on, I *knew* I wanted to climb it. A year later, here we were. Ready to hike up.

Our chaperones, including my mom, dropped us off at the trailhead a few miles from the retreat center and we began the slow ascent up through the trees, stopping along the way for water and rest. By late morning we could see the trees dispersing and the first peak of Mt. Meeker became visible. We would have to go up and down a few of these peaks before we reached the *real* one, 13,911 feet above sea level. But the views were already fantastic. Best of all, I gained a second wind and was out ahead of the group. Then I felt light rain drops. No big deal, I'll just put on my jacket. These rain drops got bigger as I walked, and soon they solidified into hail. And a low rumbling thunder came with them.

The priest who was leading us yelled to everyone to begin descending down the face of the mountain, which was a gentle slope but lacked any discernible trail. It was just rocks and shrubbery as we scrambled down, lightning bursting around us, teenagers crying, and me contemplating how much my scrawny physique resembled a lightning rod. Something very strange happened, though. A word began coming out of my mouth, almost without my volition, and every time I said it I felt safer and more secure. It wasn't any of the words you would think a dying 15-year-old would say. The word was "Mary."

Every time I spoke the name of the Blessed Mother, crawling and scrambling through the rocks in the rain, I had confidence that I would be okay. I knew I was unworthy of heaven and I was afraid of dying, but I began to sense that I was not alone. I was not orphaned. I was protected. I knew, also, that my earthly mother was on the ground below praying for us. As we got into the tree line the storm dissipated. Soaking and shivering from the cold and fear, we came together in small groups and gradually found the trail that led us back. That trail, by the way, was the John Paul II trail, named after the pope who walked on it and stayed in the retreat center in 1993. The pope whose motto was *Totus Tuus*, "Totally yours, Mary."

I have not been a perfect son of my earthly or heavenly parents. But ever since that day I am completely devoted to our Blessed Mother. Shortly after getting my license and a job at a movie theater, I began praying one decade of the rosary on my drive to work. That decade turned into two, and soon a full rosary. Mary's prayers and accompaniment saved me from lots of dumb teenage decisions and gave me the grace to overcome serious sin. She never left me.

When I drove up to the Immaculate Heart of Mary Seminary three years later, I took a picture in front of the building with my mom and the statue of Mary. My two mothers. My earthly mom is very humble about her role in my life, and she will readily give all the credit to the Blessed Virgin. But I have a degree in philosophy, so I can argue back that multiple causes create the same effect, and Mary is happy to share her role with any woman who is willing to take on the responsibility of motherhood – both physical and spiritual.

May is the month of Mary, and I don't think I have to make many theological arguments to convince those reading this that the Blessed Mother deserves all the devotion we can give her. You most likely know that anything we give Mary, she gives to Jesus, so rather than take the focus away from her son she magnifies it (Luke 1:46) and all generations call her blessed (Luke 1:48). St. Louis de Montfort, from whom St. John Paul II took his motto, tells us that total consecration to Mary is the surest, quickest, and easiest way to union with Jesus. Mary is the perfect disciple and the perfect mother.

What will you do this May for Mary? If you don't pray the rosary, consider starting with a decade a day. If you're looking for more, I invite you to consecrate yourself to Jesus through Mary using either Louis de Montfort's *Total Consecration to Mary* or Fr. Michael Gaitley's *33 Days to Morning Glory*. Mary simply wants to hold you close to her son Jesus, to bless your family, and to protect you from evil. She is the new Eve, in and through whom her son crushed the head of Satan. May her name be on our lips, especially in moments of danger and temptation. And may you feel the closeness of our Blessed Mother.




