PASTOR NOTE

NOURISHED IN SPIRIT

Myth #3: Forgiveness means weakness. This is an action packed myth filled with a lot of cultural stuff and even some male bravado. I think that we easily associate forgiveness with weakness because forgiveness is often expressed in emotional terms and at vulnerable moments. It's similar to the concept that real men don't cry. Also, when we forgive, it appears that we are placing the other in a superior position as we humbly bestow forgiveness. Many times forgiveness has the appearance of weakness. For instance, in His supremely weak moment while being nailed to the cross, Jesus said, "Father, forgive them." But, this was only a physical weakness which can be easily translated into a general weakness. Yet, in reality, the cross was Christ's greatest demonstration of power. In fact, forgiveness is one of our greatest powers. After all, the origin of forgiveness lies in God, who is all powerful. This myth often confuses appearance with reality. Don't judge a book by its cover. Forgiveness is not weakness.

Myth #4: Forgiveness means returning to the way things used to be. As we progress through the rhythms of time, there is constant change. We grow up and cannot go back to our childhood. We cannot re-capture the excitement of a graduation, a wedding, or a childbirth. For good or bad, events come and go throughout our life. Things change. Regretfully, these changes can come through difficult circumstances, pain, hurt and abuse. The very things that demand forgiveness can change our lives – even permanently. Sometimes, we can re-capture some of the way things used to be. But, sometimes we cannot. We cannot live in the past. Life is lived today, shaping the future. Forgiveness is not a return to the past; but rather, it is a choice today, moving us towards the future.

Myth #5: Forgiveness means that we will once again be close friends. Friends are truly a gift from God. They open the way to love and communion. Friends can challenge us to become a better person – even a holy person. Or, they can also be a temptation towards sin. And, of course, they can hurt us. Usually these pains are easily forgiven and can bring about mutual growth. However, the wounds can also be very deep and even repetitive. In some cases it would be bad for the friendship to continue. Friends can come and go. Sometimes, they must go for our own good and even theirs. Hopefully, forgiveness can heal the wounds within friendship. But, in some instances, the healing of forgiveness requires a friendship to end.

Invitation to Become an Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion

During Mass, Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion (EMHC) are an important ministry in the parish. I am grateful to the many volunteers who assist during Mass and bring Holy Communion to the homebound. We need more volunteers to help at Mass and visit our homebound.

I invite you to consider volunteering as an EMHC. This is a tremendous service to the parish and can help you grow closer to our Eucharistic Lord. Considering that this volunteering is directly related to the Eucharist, there are some requirements to volunteer. The Diocese summarizes these requirements as: being at least aged 18 and a "Catholic of excellent character and obvious spiritual devotion and who live their faith in harmony with the Gospel and the laws of the Church." EMHC's must attend a training session; serve at least two Masses a month; bring Communion to the homebound at least one time a month; and, receive a mandate from the Bishop.

There will be a training session of Sunday, February 5th at 1pm in the church. During this session I will explain the requirements in more detail as well as explain the manner of distributing Holy Communion. This session may be about 90 minutes. Anyone interested in becoming an EMCH is invited to attend.

I ask that all current volunteers also attend this training session. At this meeting I will discuss some aspects of distributing Communion and visiting the homebound. Also, at this meeting I will lead a prayer and recommissioning for our volunteers. I hope that you can attend.
