I am so happy to announce that the Magi Baby Chest is expanding! This past week some work was done to open up a wall between the current Magi Baby Chest and the adjacent Sheen Room. I decided to expand the Magi Baby Chest because our participating families have grown larger than we first imagined. Originally, I thought we would help about 50 families. Now, we are helping about 130 to 160 families each month. I am truly grateful to Dennis Thompson for doing the expansion work. I am thankful to the volunteers: Bill Politsch, Quint Quiram, Jessica Murphy and Ashley Gray. Thank you for your good work.

I am also grateful to all of the volunteers who worked hard to prepare the space for the expansion work and then the hard work of setting up the new Magi Baby Chest room. Thank you for moving all the things out of the room and then back into the room.

I am grateful to all of you for your generosity in making the Magi Baby Chest such a great success. Our next distribution day is Sat. May 4th, 9am-12 noon. Please help spread the word and invite families to participate in the Magi Baby Chest.

Men's Study Group: Every Thursday evening from 6pm to 7:30pm men of the parish join together for a scripture/ theology study discussion in the St. Jerome Room. We watch a video and discuss the material. It has helped many men to grow in their faith. All of the men of the parish are invited to attend each week, or whatever Thursday works in your schedule. We are starting a new series which will focus on the Fathers of the Church. The Fathers of the Church were the leaders of the Church immediately after the Apostles. During their time, they developed the Bible as we know it. This series will explore how the Father explained the teachings of Jesus in the earliest days of the Church, which still greatly influence the Church today. Our first meeting of this new series will be on Thursday, April 25th, 6pm, in the St. Jerome Room.

Obstacles Encountered by Beginners:

The special difficulties encountered by beginners in meditation arise from their inexperience, their lack of generosity and chiefly from the many distractions to which they are subject.

On account of their inexperience beginners are liable to turn their mental prayer into a sort of philosophical or theological thesis, or into a kind of sermon to themselves. This is not, indeed, a complete loss of time, since even this kind of meditation makes them give thought to the great truths of religion and strengthens their convictions. They would, however, derive greater profit if they proceeded in a more practical and a more supernatural way.

The beginner must be taught. He must learn a) that considerations, if they are to bear practical fruit, must be made more personal, be applied to themselves and be followed by an examination in order to see to what extent the truths on which they meditate influence their lives, and what must be done in order to live by these truths during the course of the day; b) that the most important part of meditation is found in the acts of the will: acts of adoration, thanks-giving and love toward God; acts of humility, of sorrow, of firm purpose of amendment; acts of petition to obtain the grace of correcting their faults; and finally, firm and frequently repeated resolutions of doing better throughout the day.

Their lack of generosity exposes them to discouragement when they no longer upheld by sensible consolations God graciously bestowed on them at the outset in order to draw them unto Himself. Obstacles and the first spells of aridity dishearten them, and thinking themselves abandoned by God, they drift into carelessness. Hence, they must be made to see that what God asks is effort and not success, that perseverance in prayer, despite difficulties, is so much the richer in merit, and that God having proved Himself so generous towards them, to turn back when effort is required, would be an act of cowardice. These directions should be tempered by the mildness with which they are given and by paternal words of comfort.

THE LITURGICAL CORNER

Last week we relearned a technical term called transubstantiation. This week we refer to another technical term, the ambo. We are all familiar with the term 'pulpit' or 'lectern.' The technical term for these is the 'ambo.' The word 'ambo' comes from the Greek language, meaning "a raised place." At this raised place a lectern was used on which to place the Sacred Scriptures. You may remember in the Tridentine Rite of Mass (the Latin version of Mass which was used prior to the Second Vatican Council), one side of the Church was used for the Epistle, and the other side for the Gospel. Presently we are instructed that all the readings are to be from one place, the ambo. This is because all of Scripture is inspired. The reason the word for 'a raised place' was used was due to the fact that in very large churches, in order that everyone could easily hear the readings and the homily, the place needed to be raised. This is the way it is, for example, in our own Cathedral in Philadelphia. With the invention of the microphone, the necessity for raising the ambo no longer exists. Yet it still remains one of the three most important fixed structures in the sanctuary (the other two being the altar and the chair for the celebrant, sometimes called presidential chair.)
