PASTOR NOTE

There are only a few weeks left in the holy season of Lent. I hope that it has been a time of renewal for you. But, as things go, our good Lenten intentions often fall short. Do not grow discouraged. Instead, get back on track with your penances and Lenten intentions. God can do great things for you in the remaining weeks of Lent. I encourage you to embrace regular routines of prayer, devotions and mortification. Join us for the Stations of the Cross and our parish retreat. Maybe you have never attended the special events of the Holy Triduum. I encourage you to join us for Holy Thursday Mass, Good Friday Service, and the Easter Vigil. Experience these incredible rituals that are the culmination of our Lenten renewal. Let's finish strong in our Lenten renewal.

Stations of the Cross: I hope that you have taken the opportunity to join us for the Stations of the Cross during Lent. There are only two opportunities left, I hope you will come to one or both. The two remaining Stations are March 22nd, 5pm; and, Good Friday, March 29th, 12 noon.

HVAC Replacement: The HVAC units for Harkrader Hall are original to the building. A few months ago, I announced that the units were breaking down and needed to be replaced. I am happy to announce that last week they were replaced providing up-to-date units. These new units cost about \$50,000. I am grateful for donations that we have received for this repair. Lent Retreat: Our Parish Lenten Retreat will be on Sunday, March 24th from 1pm to 6pm. During this retreat we will enjoy some spiritual reflections focusing on the Stations of the Cross. We will develop our own meditations on the Stations of the Cross. We will have Eucharistic Adoration beginning at 4:30pm which will include confessions, rosary, and evening prayer. Please join us for our retreat or at least Eucharistic Adoration.

Holy Week Schedule: Holy Thursday Mass, 7pm. Good Friday Stations, 12 noon, Service, 3pm. Holy Saturday, Easter Vigil Mass, 8pm. Regretfully, there are no candidates entering the Church at the Easter Vigil. We will still enjoy a party following the Easter Vigil. Easter Sunday, 7:30am, 9:00am (incense free), 10:30am.

Extra Confessions: One of the best ways to receive our Lord's saving grace during Holy Week is by making a good confession. I encourage you to make a good confession during one of these extra Confession times: Mon. 3/25 at 5pm; Tue. 3/26 at 7:30am; Wed. 3/27 at 5pm; Thur. 3/28at 4pm; Fri. 3/29 after 12pm Stations; Sat. 3/30 at 3pm.

Divine Mercy Parish Celebration: Sunday, April 7, 2:30pm Adoration, 3pm Divine Mercy Chaplet followed by Benediction, 3:30 dinner from Los Ranchitos, followed by family and kids' activities, adult social time, and wonderful door prizes.

The Spiritual Life: Excerpt from *The Spiritual Life* by Adolphe Tanquerey, Desclee and Co., Belgium, 1951.

Meditation makes us also practice all the great Christian virtues. It enlightens our faith by bringing before our eyes the eternal truths; it sustains our hope by giving us access to God to obtain His help; it enkindles our love by exposing to our view the beauty and the goodness of God. It makes us prudent by supplying us with considerations to be taken into account before we act; it makes us just by having us conform our will to that of God; it renders us strong by making us share in God's own power; and temperate by cooling the ardor of our passions. There is no Christian virtue which we cannot acquire by daily meditation. Through it we hold fast to the truth, and the truth, freeing us from our vices, makes us practice virtue: "You shall know the truth and the truth shall make you free."

Meditation therefore initiates our union with God, nay more, our transformation into Him. It is, in fact, a conversation with God which from day to day becomes more intimate, more tender, and longer, since it continues the day long, even in the midst of our activities. By virtue of daily interaction with the Author of all perfection, we drink of His fulness, and are permeated by it, like the sponge by the water. We are transformed like the iron in the furnace that kindles, softens, and assumes the properties of living fire.

THE LITURGICAL CORNER

Perhaps you have noticed that when the priest breaks the Sacred Host right before Holy Communion, he drops a small particle of it into the chalice, which now contains the Precious Blood of Jesus Christ, and when he does so, he quietly prays this prayer: "May this mingling of the Body and Blood of Our Lord Jesus bring eternal life to us who receive it." Clearly, this is a wonderful affirmation that what we receive in Holy Communion is truly food for everlasting life.

The origin of this practice takes us all the way back to the very early days of the Church in Rome. It was the custom at the pope's Mass for the deacon and other ministers to take particles of the Host consecrated by the Pope to various other Masses being held elsewhere in outlying districts in the city of Rome. These particles were called "fermentum." When the deacon arrived at the other Masses, that particle was then dropped into the chalice at the time we do so now, right before Holy Communion. It was meant to serve as a symbol of the unity of that local gathering with the papal celebration, and we can imagine that it must have had quite an effect on those who witnessed this ritual, since they knew that this 'fermentum' came from the Pope's Mass. Though now the gesture of the commingling, as it is called, no longer evokes the same sentiments, it can still be a reminder that those who partake of the Eucharist express their unity of faith with the Church, whose visible head is the Supreme Pontiff in Rome.



Did you Know? Your child can attend a Catholic School—Financial Assistance Is Available

Tuition assistance scholarship grants from the endowment fund established as a result of the Diocese of Peoria ROOTED IN FAITH Campaign and named in honor of Archbishop Spalding, the first Bishop of Peoria, will be available for the 2024-2025 school year for students enrolled in or intending to enroll in grades Kindergarten through 12 in any Catholic school located in the Diocese of Peoria whose families are active members of a Catholic parish in the diocese. All grants will be based on financial need objectively assessed.

Information about the grants and application materials may be obtained from any Catholic elementary or secondary school in the Diocese of Peoria or on the Diocesan website www.cdop.org under *Catholic Education* and then under *Financial Assistance*. Consult the detailed protocols and procedures and checklist for all requirements necessary to be eligible for an award.

Parents must apply online at: online.factsmgt.com/aid. Families of students currently receiving grants are reminded that all grants are for one year only, and anyone seeking to renew a grant for the 2024-2025 school year must reapply. Deadline date for the completed application is **April 26, 2024**. Notification of grant awards will be made in June of 2024.
