PASTOR NOTE

I have expressed many times that I desire for our parish to be truly a family. Families regularly gather and enjoy time together. So, I hope that our parish will come together regularly. I want to highlight some of the opportunities for our parish to come together. I don't highlight every parish program but only a few of them. As you know our bulletin always includes announcements of our parish events.

Every Wednesday from 1pm to 3pm our parish hosts a Euchre Card Party. It is a wonderful opportunity to make new friends. Everyone is welcome, parishioners or non-parishioners. Often, we share treats and always have a good time together. We welcome new players or experts. We throw in a dollar each to provide a high and low score prize. You might win enough for a good cup of coffee! Come each week or whenever you are able.

Each Thursday at 6pm, our parish holds the Men's Study Group. We have started a new series discussing the meaning of holiness. All men of the parish are invited to come to these meetings. It is a wonderful opportunity to grow in faith. Please join us each week or whenever you are able.

Each Friday at 8am, our parish hosts the Women's Study Group, where they reflect on the Scriptures. They meet in the parish library, often with treats. All the women of the parish are encouraged to attend and grow in the faith.

Each Saturday at 7am, our parish hosts the weekly Holy Hour for Men. All of the men of our parish are invited to attend. We enjoy Eucharistic adoration, hear a brief reflection on the Gospel and a chance for confessions. This is a wonderful opportunity to grow in the faith.

Each fourth Sunday of the month at 6pm our parish hosts a Pro Life Holy Hour where we pray for the end to abortion and pray for advancement of the dignity of life. This is a wonderful opportunity to join together in prayer for such a truly worthy cause.

Lent is coming soon – Ash Wednesday is February 14th. Once again during Lent we will have Small Groups reflecting on the week's Gospel. Very soon you will have the opportunity to sign up for one of these Lent Small Groups. I think this was a wonderful experience for everyone last year and last Fall. I encourage everyone to sign up for these small groups. If you have not attended a small group in the past, you are encouraged to give it a chance. It would be a wonderful opportunity to grow in the faith. Each group meets for about an hour and there is no homework.

The Spiritual Life: Excerpt from The Spiritual Life by Adolphe Tanquerey, Desclee and Co., Belgium, 1951.

Conditions on the Part of the Subject:

The most essential conditions to ensure the efficacy of our prayers are: humility, confidence, and attention, or at least the earnest to be attentive.

The need for humility flows from the very nature of prayer. Since grace is a free gift of God to which we have no right whatever, we are as St. Augustine says, but beggars in relation to God, and we must implore of His mercy what we cannot demand as a right. It was thus that Abraham prayed, considering himself but dust and ashes in presence of Divine Majesty: "I will speak to my Lord, whereas I am dust and ashes." Thus, did Daniel pray when he asked for the deliverance of the Jewish people, relying not on his merits and virtues, but on God's overflowing mercies: "It is not for our justifications that we present our prayers before thy face, but for the multitude of thy tender mercies." Thus, prayed the publican, who was also head: "O God, be merciful to me a sinner," whilst the proud Pharisee saw his prayer rejected. Jesus Himself gives us the reason: "Every one that exalts himself shall be humbled; and he that humbles himself shall be exalted." His Disciples understood this well. St. James insists that "God resists the proud and gives grace to the humble." This is mere justice: the proud man attributes to himself the efficacy of his prayer, whilst the humble man attributes it to God. Now, can we expect that God will hear us to the detriment of His own glory, in order to flatter our vain complacency? The humble soul, on the contrary, sincerely acknowledges that all it has is from God, and hence God in hearkening to his prayers procures His own glory as well as the welfare of him who prays.

Humility in turn begets confidence, a confidence based, not upon our merits but upon the goodness of God and upon the merits of Jesus Christ.

Faith teaches us that God is merciful and that because He is merciful, He turns to us with greater love the more we acknowledge our miseries, for misery appeals to mercy. To call upon Him with confidence is in reality to honor Him, to proclaim Him as the source of all gifts, and as desiring nothing so much as to bestow them upon us. In the Scriptures He affirms again and again that He hearkens to those who hope in Him: "Because he hoped in me, I will deliver him... He shall cry to me and I will hear him."

THE LITURGICAL CORNER

Probably one of the first prayers we learned as a child was the sign of the Cross. We begin and end our prayers by making this sign which identifies us as Catholic Christians. Since the Mass is the highest form of prayer, it is only natural that we begin and end this prayer with the sign of the Cross as well. When we make the sign of the Cross, especially at Mass, we are affirming three things:

 The sign of the Cross is credal. In other words, we profess our faith in God who is a Trinity, Father, Son and Holy Spirit. By simply making the sign of the Cross, we are

professing our faith.

2. The sign of the Cross is baptismal. When we were baptized it was done 'in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.' Every time we make the sign of the Cross, it serves as a renewal of our baptismal promises. After all, the reason why we can call God "Our Father" is because through our baptism He has adopted us and made us His children. We have the privilege and duty of worshipping God at the Eucharist precisely because we have been baptized.

3. The sign of the Cross is exorcistic. When we make the sign of the Cross, we are recalling that it was the death of Christ on the Cross, which we celebrate in the Eucharist, which freed us from the bondage of sin and the power of evil. So in making the sign of the Cross, we are affirming that in our struggle with evil, there is a power in our lives, the power of the Cross of Christ, which helps us to live virtuous, Christian lives, even in the midst of evil.


