PASTOR NOTE

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, February 14th. Masses will be at 7am and 6pm.

It is a truly rare thing for Ash Wednesday to fall on St. Valentine's Day. Although it happened in 2018, its last time was back in 1945. It will happen again in 2029, but then not again until well into the next century. Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are the two premiere days of fasting and abstinence in the Church's year. The rules for Ash Wednesday are not dispensed – even for St. Valentine's Day. So, I recommend that you be creative this year. Maybe simply celebrate your loving relationship on Tuesday or next weekend. But, for Ash Wednesday, maintain the rules! Let's keep Lent in VaLENTine's Day!

Norms for Lenten Observance:

- 1. Everyone of 14 years of age or over is bound to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday, February 14, 2024, and all the Fridays of Lent.
- 2. Everyone 18 years of age and under 59 years of age is bound to fast on Ash Wednesday, February 14, 2024, and Good Friday, March 29, 2024.
- 3. On these two days of fast and abstinence, Ash Wednesday and Good Friday, only one full meatless meal is allowed. Two other meatless meals, sufficient to maintain strength, may be taken according to each one's needs, but together they should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted on these two days, but liquids including milk and fruit juices are allowed. When health or ability to work would be seriously affected, the law does not oblige.
- 4. To disregard completely the law of fast and abstinence is a serious matter.

Lent Small Groups: We will once again have Small Group meetings reflecting on the Sunday Gospel. These small groups will follow the same format as last fall and Lent. I invite you to consider joining a small group, especially if you have not participated in the past. Lent Small Groups will begin the week of February 18th. Small Groups will meet that these times: Monday, 11am; Monday, 6pm; Wednesday, 3:30pm; Thursday, 1pm; Friday, 9am. You may sign up for a Small Group time by completing the form below, signing up through Flocknotes, or calling the Parish Office.

Lenten Companion: Walking with Jesus to Jerusalem from Ascension Press. As you know, our parish uses Flocknote to communicate and grow in faith. Flocknote provides a free series of Lenten reflections. Each week these five-minute video reflections will be emailed to those who participate in Flocknote. Please contact the Parish Office to sign up for Flocknote and receive parish messages and these Lenten reflections.

Ascension Press describes these reflections: Relationship with God grown stale? Plagued by a particular sin you just can't shake? Tired of the day-to-day grind of your life? This Lent, experience deeper peace and healing as Fr. Mark Toups immerses you in Christ's final journey to Jerusalem, inviting you to reflect on Jesus' suffering and death and celebrate in his resurrection.

Other Lenten Resources: Our parish participates in Formed, which provides Catholic educational recourses. Formed offers a daily Lenten Scripture reflection series called Daily Bread which provides Eucharistic reflections. Formed also offers a kids focused Lenten reflection using sacred art. You can sign up for both programs by visiting: formed.org.

Stations of the Cross will be held each Friday of Lent on Friday, 5pm. I hope that you can join us for at least one time, if not all.

Parish Trivia Night will be held on Saturday, March 2nd, 6:30pm. Start pulling your team together.

Parish Fish Fry will be held on Friday, March 15th — details to follow in next weekend's bulletin.

Parish Lent Retreat will be held on Sunday, March 24th, 1pm to 6pm.

THE LITURGICAL CORNER

As Catholics, our faith rests on the one Word of God as it comes to us in Sacred Scripture, Sacred Tradition and the Magisterium (that is, the teaching office of the Church). Because the sacred Scriptures are a source of revelation, these words from the Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy from Vatican II make complete sense: "The treasures of the Bible are to be opened up more lavishly, so that richer fare may be provided for the faithful at the table of God's word. In this way a more representative portion of the holy Scriptures will be read to the people in the course of a prescribed number of years." (Article 51). The way the Church has responded to this need for an increased use of Scripture in the Liturgy is to provide what is known as a cycle of readings. There are two cycles: one for Sundays and one for weekdays.

The Sunday cycle is a three-year cycle, known simply as Years A, B and C. It was determined to develop the Sunday cycle by using the gospels of Matthew (Year A), Mark (Year B) and Luke (Year C). We are presently in Year B, so Mark is the gospel used. What about the gospel of John? It was decided not to have a whole year for John, but to use portions of the gospel of John for the Easter season. Also, since Mark's gospel is the shortest, passages from the Gospel of John are also used during Year B. The First and Second Reading, as well as responsorial psalm, also change with each year.

<u>The weekday cycle</u> is a two-year cycle, known simply as Year One and Year Two. Year One are odd-numbered years, and Year Two are even numbered years. Since a good portion of the gospels are read during the three year cycle, the gospel remains the same for both Year One and Year Two, but the first reading and responsorial psalm are different, in order to provide a broader use of other parts of the Scriptures beside the gospels.


The Spiritual Life: Excerpt from *The Spiritual Life* by Adolphe Tanquerey, Desclee and Co., Belgium, 1951.

To this persevering confidence we must join attention, or at least the serious effort to realize and to means what we say to God. Involuntary distractions do not constitute an obstacle to prayer as long as we strive to overcome them or reduce their number, for by these very efforts our soul keeps on its course toward God. They constitute, indeed, a loss though not a sin, but this loss may be made good in a measure by our efforts to pray attentively. On the contrary, voluntary distractions, those we freely and deliberately entertain, or which we but faintly repel, or the causes of which we are unwilling to suppress, are venial sins, since they constitute a lack of due respect towards God. Prayer is an audience which our Creator is kind enough to grant us: a conversation we hold with our Heavenly Father, wherein we beg Him to vouchsafe to hearken to our words and heed our request: "Give ear, O Lord to my words...Hearken to the voice of my prayer." Through voluntary distractions we do no less than refuse to make serious effort to understand what we say and to be attentive to the divine voice; and this, at the very moment we ask the Almighty to hear us and to speak to us! Do we not deserve the reproach our Lord cast upon the Pharisees: "This people honors me with their lips: but their heart is far from me?" Does this not constitute a glaring inconsistency as well as a lack of religion?

We must, then, strive seriously to repel promptly and firmly the distractions that present themselves to our mind; we must readily humble ourselves when they occur and unite again our prayer with the perfect prayer of Jesus. We must, likewise, reduce the number of such distractions by a vigorous fight against their causes: habitual dissipation of mind, the habit of day dreaming, the preoccupations and attachments that absorb the mind and the heart. We must also accustom ourselves little by little to recall frequently to mind God's presence, by offering up to Him our actions, as well as ardent ejaculatory prayers. Once we have taken these means, there is no cause for worry concerning such involuntary distractions as run through our minds or disturb our imagination. These are but trials, not faults, and once we have learned to profit by them, they but increase our merit and the value of our prayers.
