

A MESSAGE FROM FATHER HEPNER

Dear parishioners,

When I was seventeen I got tired of driving the old junker that my brother had handed down to me and I decided it was time to open up the classifieds and find a sweet ride to buy with all the cash I saved from my movie theater job. I came across a maroon, 1991 Chrysler LeBaron convertible that I bought from a guy who never gave me his home phone number and met me in a parking lot. Needless to say, there were things wrong with it. Besides leaking rain on my prom date through the ragtop, it also burnt oil. No problem – every week or so I just topped it off with more. But one afternoon I was late for work, so I unscrewed the cap, put the oil in, and drove away. Two miles down the road, smoke began billowing from my engine. I forgot to put the cap back on. The engine was shot.

Wouldn't it be crazy if I wrote to the manufacturer and complained that my car should be able to function normally without an oil cap? Yet for some reason there are plenty of people in the world who rail against the Church for telling us what actions will make us happy and fulfill our purpose as humans and what actions will leave us like a smoking heap of maroon wreckage on the side of the road. Just like my oil cap, everything that God gave us serves a purpose, and we can choose to live according to that plan or not. But we have no right to complain when we violate God's plan and it damages our soul, hurts our relationship with others, and separates us from God

In the last bulletin article we meditated on God's plan for human bodies, human love, and sexuality. Those who disagree with the Church on these things disparagingly call them "pelvic" issues and accuse the Church of being obsessed with them. The Church is obsessed with salvation, with human happiness, and with giving God what he deserves. And in an extremely confused culture that seems to have thrown the manual out of the glovebox when it comes to these topics, the Church unabashedly teaches the truth with love.

It's easy to understand what an oil cap is for. But what is marriage and sexuality for? What is the purpose of sexual difference? The short answer is babies and bonding. This union between a man and woman is uniquely powerful because it can bring about new life and it can bond the two together emotionally,

spiritually, and physiologically like nothing else. God is so enamored with every human person that he wants us each to be able to say, "My mom and dad loved each other so much that I cam into existence." He wants us to be born out of and into a stable, exclusive, unbreakable bond of love that existed before us and will continue after us.

Sadly, we know this isn't always the case. Parents can die, be separated, and leave one another. Parents might not be married. Or, these days, a child might be one of millions of fertilized embryos that was conceived and frozen in a lab. Some of these things are outside of our control. Others are within it. It's very complicated. But it's essential that we look toward God's intention for humanity and, more specifically, for relations between man and woman, if we are to understand how to make decisions that lead to growth and flourishing.

So in the future in this space I will publish the owner's manual for human love and address the topics of marriage, divorce, contraception, pornography, same -sex marriage, and transgender issues. But these can't all just be "issues." We have to see them in light of God's wise, loving plan for human happiness. Otherwise it just becomes another debate based on human opinions. We need to consult a reality beyond ourselves, and thankfully that reality is a Communion of Persons who loves us and made us from love and for love. And I will never write about these things apart from God's mercy. As I said, things are complicated. They get messy. Sometimes we get hurt, and sometimes we do the hurting. But the Father will never leave us broken down by the side of the road. Instead he will come running down the road to lift us up, embrace us, and heal us. And, like my parents did that day, he will show us what the oil cap is really for.


