A MESSAGE FROM MSGR. KRUSE

Since arriving at the parish, I have been considering some policy issues regarding parish facility rental and funerals. I have made a few decisions which our parish will follow these policies. Please contact me if you have any questions. – Msgr. Kruse

Parish Facility Rental: This policy includes rental of Harkrader Hall, the pavilion, and the gymnasium for private events. Rental will no longer be provided by the parish. There are a few reasons for this decision. First, rental always includes a lot of time and energy including scheduling, set-up, cleaning, securing insurance and monitoring the event, which is simply too time consuming for me and the parish staff. Second, it is quite difficult to schedule rentals in relation to the myriad of parish activities. Third, I am concerned of the wear and tear on our facilities that is associated with rental. Regular parish activities, including funeral luncheons, will continue. Finally, please remember that renting our facilities is ancillary to the overall mission of the parish.

Funerals: Funerals are an important function within the parish as we remember the deceased and bring comfort to the family. The funeral liturgy is well established by the Church and should be respected. This liturgy includes three actions: the visitation (rosary or scripture service), the funeral Mass and the final committal at the cemetery. There has been a growing trend for the visitation to be held at the church prior to the funeral Mass. Visitations at the church provide a variety of difficulties, especially balancing the respect for the sacred space of the church with the visiting of family and guests. Also, our church space does not easily accommodate a visitation. Therefore, I have decided that visitations will not be held in the church. Instead, visitations should be held at one of the local funeral homes. On very rare occasions, I may allow an exception to this general rule.

Eulogies offered by a family member have also been a growing trend. Although the eulogy may bring comfort to the family, the eulogy is not an integral part to the funeral liturgy. Many times, the secular nature of a eulogy detracts from the sacred funeral liturgy. Eulogies are best offered at the visitation, burial, luncheon or in some rare circumstances, immediately prior to the funeral Mass. Eulogies will not be allowed during the funeral Mass.

Music is integral to the funeral Mass. The music ought to be drawn from our Catholic tradition. Secular music will not be allowed during the funeral Mass. Secular music is best used at the end of visitation rituals, after the committal rituals, or at the luncheon.

NOURISHED IN SPIRIT BY MSGR. KRUSE

Unity with Jesus requires unity with his Church. Outside of his Church, we are exposed to the whims of opinion, fantasy, mythology and error. Only the Church keeps us grounded and connected with the true Jesus. Our spiritual perfection is found only in Jesus. And, the fullness of truly knowing the real Jesus is found only in the Church that he established. Therefore, our spiritual perfection must include our unity with the Church. We cannot grow to perfection unless we become more and more perfectly united to the Church. Our perfection and our union with the Church are inseparable because Jesus and his Church are inseparable.

So, when answering the question, *Who is Jesus?*, our answer cannot simply be based upon history books, movies, conversations with friends, or our own opinion. It must be based upon the life and teaching of the Church. As we pursue spiritual perfection we must examine our relationship with the Church of Jesus. We must strive to be more and more united to the Church which, if fact, is to be more and more united to Christ.

From her earliest days the Church has been proclaiming the complete truth of Christ and she has safeguarded that truth down through the centuries. Apart from the Church, our understanding of Jesus can slip into illusion, fantasy and error, leaving us separated from the fullness of Christ's saving mission. Union with Christ requires union of his Church. Our perfection must include unity with Christ in his Church.

In our journey towards perfection, we must now examine our union with the Church. What would full communion look like? Reflect upon your relationship and understanding of the Church. How important is the Church in your life? How completely are you united to the Church? What is your relationship to the Church? What does true membership and participation look like?

Answers to these questions can take great time and detail to answer. But, for a summary we can look to the baptism ritual of the Catholic Church. Immediately after someone is baptized, the priest or deacon anoints the person's head with sacred chrism while saying the words, "As Christ was anointed priest, prophet and king, so may you always live as a member of his body, sharing everlasting life." These three characteristics of Jesus can be a good foundation for understanding one's participation in Christ and his Church. They are three functions of Christ, the Church and the individual.


